The Nottingham Country Garden Club meets 9:30 a.m. on the first Thursday of the month, September through May, at the Municipal Utility District (MUD) Building No. 81, located at 805 Hidden Canyon Drive.

"We just have a lot of fun," Straub said. "We do field trips and hands-on projects. Last year, we did a winery tour. This year, we're including trips up to Arbor Gate and out to a daylily farm."

Straub enjoys growing a variety of flowering plants and trees in her personal garden. Her favorites include poinsettias, which
