## Monthly Gardening '[asks - March

#### \*Perennials & Annuals

If "spring fever" has set in and you just have to plant some pretty flowers, go ahead and plant cool-season flowers such as pansies and snapdragons, but know that they will wilt away come June when the heat sets in. Some better choices might be cockscombs, coreopsis, cosmos, cleomes, marigolds, nasturtiums, petunias (especially the Laura Bush and Wave varieties), salvias, sweet allysums, sunflowers, and zinnias. Fertilize annual and perennial flowers once this month. Dr. Doug Welsh recommends using urea, ammonium sulfate or blood meal. Cut back dead foliage on perennials and ornamental grasses only after you have seen new green growth emerging from the plant base. Divide fall-blooming perennials such as chrysanthemums, autumn asters, Mexican marigold mint, and physostegia (obedient plant). Remember to always use plenty of organic matter (mulch or compost) when setting out new plants.

### \*Vegetables & Herbs:

Before planting spring vegetables, prepare your beds with organic matter. The following vegetables can be planted in March from seed: beans (bush and pole from mid-March on), cantaloupe, corn, peppers (transplants), summer squash, tomatoes (transplants, should be In by mid-march), and watermelon. Warm-season herbs such as basil, mint, chives, lemon grass, lemon verbena, Mexican mint marigold, oregano, rosemary, and thyme can be planted now. Fertilize with a complete fertilizer, such as 15-5-10. Make this fertilizer application prior to each garden season, spring and fall.

#### \*Trees and Shrubs:

Plant new shrubs and trees, either grown in containers or balled-and-burlapped (it's too late for bare root). Examples of summer blooming shrubs are althea (rose of Sharon), butterfly bush, crepe myrtle, glossy abelia, and vitex (chaste tree). Prune azaleas after blooming. Fertilize azaleas and camellias after blooming.

#### \*Texas Wildflowers

Hopefully, with the recent rains, our native wildflowers will put on a show this year.
