*Perennials & Annuals

Time to replace unproductive cool-season annuals. The following plants are recommended for heat tolerance: marigold, penta, periwinkle, portulaca, purslane, salvia, angelonia, blanketflower (gallardia), begonia, bulbine, cleome, coleus, coneflower, croton, cuphea, guara, gomphrena, helenium, impatiens, lantana, melochia, plumbago, rudbeckia (black-eyed Susan), russelia (firecracker plant), shrimp plant, sociaty garlic, summer phlox, torenia, and zinnia. Be sure to remove spent flowers (dead-head) to encourage continuous bloom. Apply a nitrogen fertilizer monthly. Be sure to mulch to help retain moisture and check the soil often now. Dripirrigation may need to begin this month if rains taper off.

*Vegetables & Herbs:

The following vegetables and herbs can be successfully started from seed in May and June: basil, lima beans (early May), cucumbers, and okra (early May), The insect population explodes in late spring, so visit the garden daily and keep a close watch. It's much easier to rid your plants of harmful insects when the population is still small. Remember to begin with the least toxic method of control first (ie: strong water spray for aphids, brushing leaf-footed bugs into a jar of soapy water). Watch for early blight on your tomato leaves. This fungal disease is characterized by dead and dying leaves at the bottom of the plant. Pick off the dead leaves, but use of a fungicide may be needed if the disease is wide-spread. Mulch heavily around the plants to prevent water from splashing on the foliage, which will help prevent blight. *Trees and Shrubs:

Crepe myrtles are blooming. Remember to prune off the dead bloom spikes to keep the plant blooming. Water fruit trees heavily now. Established bearing trees will need 2-6 cups (depending on the size of the tree) of 21-0-0 fertilizer (such as ammonia sulphate). Camellias and azaleas are setting flowers for next season, so keep well mulched and watered. *Roses

Prune climbing roses as they complete their bloom season. Hybrid teas require application of fungicide each week to prevent black spot. (Note: Earth Kind roses are more resistant to mildew and black spot than the hybrid tea roses). Encourage lady beetles in all their larval stages and also adults as aphid predators. Continue fertilizing every 4-6 weeks and apply 2-3" of mulch.

*Daylilies

Daylilies reach their peak of bloom in May-June. Watch the Houston Chronicle for daylily sales and events. Go
